# Mealy Mountain Collegiate Social Studies 8

## **Program Description**

This Newfoundland and Labrador History course introduces Grade 8 students to the study of the story of Newfoundland and Labrador from the turn of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century to the present. It is an interesting and dynamic period of development from colony of Great Britain – to independent country – to province of Canada. This course examines the time when settlements and institutions were established and shaped Newfoundland and Labrador into what it is today.

## **Units of Study:**

- 1. Discovering and Appreciating History: Understanding the Historical Method (Chapter 1)
  - Understanding History and Developing Skills of a Historian
- 2. "Where Once They Stood We Stand": History as a Story of People in Newfoundland and Labrador 1800-1914 (Chapters 2-5)
  - Examination of Aboriginal Peoples, immigrants and Newfoundlanders and Labradorians
  - Examination of self-sufficiency, fishermen and their families, fish merchants, sealers, trappers and other occupations
  - Understanding how government evolved and how it responded to challenges
  - Understanding the lifestyles of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century including family life, entertainment, community and communication
- 3. "Storm Gusts Fret Thy Shore": history as a Story of Significant Events in Newfoundland and Labrador 1914-1945 (Chapters 6-8)
  - Involvement in World War I and its aftermath
  - Development of Newfoundland and Labrador's land-based industries, important disasters and crises and the creation of Commission of Government
  - Involvement in World War II and its impact
- 4. "We Are Thy Sons and Daughters": History as a Story of Change in Newfoundland and Labrador 1945-Present (Chapters 9-12)
  - The movement towards Confederation, modernization and the social change as a province of Canada
  - Challenges and opportunities before and after 1971 including identity and cultural expression
